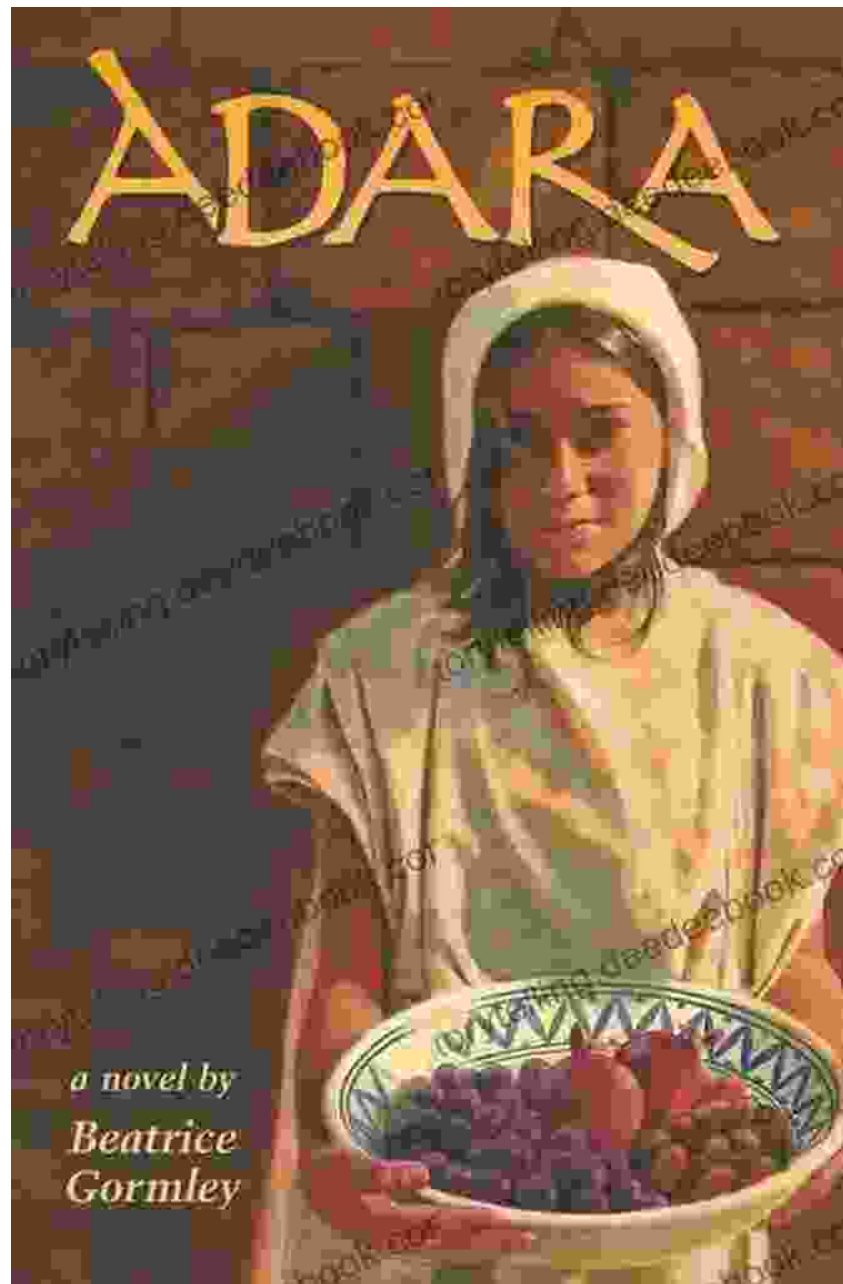


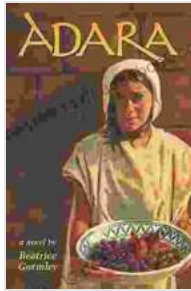
Adara Beatrice Gormley: A Trailblazing Artist and Pioneer of Contemporary Sculpture
