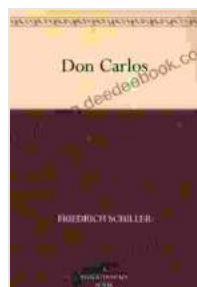


Don Carlos Friedrich Schiller: A Poetic Titan and Philosophical Visionary

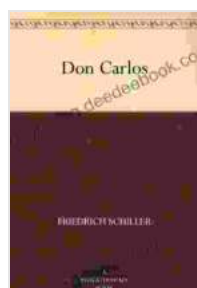
